

SAHARA ARMCHAIR

The **Sahara Armchair** represents the evolution of a chair that the British Army, more than a century ago, designed for use in the camps. The chair had to be lightweight, portable, extremely robust, very comfortable and suitable to the ground.

These qualities were obtained by putting together the wooden parts, connected and held together by fabric components tightened by leather straps.



The **Sahara Armchair** has preserved the original design but with some important innovations: the velcro instead of leather straps, a new generation fabric, washable and durable to make the product easier to use.

In addition the wood is also treated and salt resistant.

The production is totally made in Italy in order to maintain high product quality.

The **Sahara Armchair** is provided together with a small carry-bag for ease of transportation and storage.



HISTORY

At the end of 1800 in Roorkee (India) at the British Army Command was designed a chair to be used in the camps comfortable, solid and transportable.

This chair has also influenced many modern designers: Marcel Breuer's "Wassily" chair (1925), Le Corbusier's "Teeter" chair (1928), Wilhelm Bofinger's "Farmer Chair" (1966) and Vico Magistretti's "Armchair 905" (1964).
